We are hoping to offer 4 harp solo spaces, 1 mixed chamber ensemble and 1 harp duo.

The Future Blend Project launched in 2015.

It grew into an annual solo harp composition competition that brought together composers and harpists to create brand new music for the Harp.

Each year 8-10 finalists were chosen from anonymous scores, they then had 5 months to work with their harpist to create the best piece possible for the instrument. The harpists are some of the most exciting and experienced young professionals in the world. So far composers have had the chance to work with Eleanor Turner, Camilla Pay, Shelley Fairplay, Olivia Jaguers, Sophie Rocks, Erica Sinclair, Rosanna Moore, Fran Barsby and many many more!

The Hidden Gem Concert was held in the first few weeks of January and was the showcase and World Premier of the 10 new works.

The evolution of FBP to the PoppyHarp Composers Project.

FBP took a break over the pandemic but is launching again in 2024.

2024: We will be recapping and showcasing the fantastic works that were celebrated in previous FBP concerts. We will also be relaunching our project and composers can submit works to work with our harpists from anywhere around the world. We have spaces available to work with 5 harpists. Composers that wish to rerelease their music will be made available on this or our partners website.

Applying to the PoppyHarp Composers Project

- 1. We accept submissions written for harp solo or harp duo and harp chamber.
- 2. You can be at any stage of your compositional journey but must be over 18 to participate.
- 3. Your work does not have to be finished but give a good impression of what you are trying to achieve.
- 4. We require a small write up about where you are in your compositional journey. We use this information to better understand what you hope to gain from the project and be able to pair you with the harpist most suited to you.
- 5. You do not have to have written for or worked with a harpist before.
- 6. You can submit a piece that has been looked at previously by a harpist and performed, however, you must be willing to take advice and revisions on your music. Please let us know in your application if your piece has previously been looked at by a harpist.
- 7. Your music must not be on sale. If your sheet music has been published unfortunately we cannot accept your application (Published = your sheet is available to the general public to be purchase online or in physical form. If your music is published as an audio file only we can still accept your application. We are only concerned with sheet music publications. However, you must have full rights to take part in the music, hold sole copyright of your music and there must be no conflict of interests in any other projects, performances or grants you are a part of.)
- 8. Composers hold the rights to their work. We ask that harpists are acknowledged for their input. Composers are liable for any copyright infringements/allegations. The composer retains the rights to their music throughout the entirety of the project.
- 9. To maximise the benefits of the project we suggest you try to "meet" with your harpist 5 times throughout the project. These can be zoom meetings, phone calls, email exchanges, WhatsApp messages... whatever suits you as a team. But please do touch base with each other each month to ensure you continue to be on the same page with the music. Please be patient with one another as we all have busy working schedules.
- 10. During the project we ask composers to participate in some social media to promote your music, the composers, the harpists, the project and composing for the harp. The deadlines and requirements for these can be found on the next page.
- 11. Any form of abuse (behaviour or verbal) between any members of any project will not be tolerated and will result in immediate termination of the project.
- 12. Throughout the project if you post anything on social media please ensure you are tagging @poppyharp and your composer/harpist.
 - For example: Meetings If you both consent to a screenshot of your zoom for something on socials please send it to me or tag @PoppyHarp!
 - Harpists Practice: If you and your harpist/composer both consent to a video or update throughout the project please send it to me or tag @PoppyHarp! Please ensure any videos/posts are also credited Harpist/Composer/PoppyHarp Composers Project
 - **Do you have to do videos?** No. Videos are best for social media engagements but if you really hate this please don't worry. Instead please send me a short paragraph and a photo (if you have one).

Exceptional circumstances:

The PoppyHarp Composers Project aims to run as seamlessly as possible. Sometimes exceptional circumstances arise as we are all working full time outside of the project, have families, are studying etc. Mental health and personal security whether that be health, financial or otherwise comes first. If a harpist or composer is unable to complete the project we will take steps to try to ensure that you are able to participate with another harpist or in a future project.

FAQ's

What are the key dates of the project?

31st March (midnight) Application deadline 26th - 28th April - composers are contacted with the results May/ June - composers are announced. November - Videos are released.

What happens to your music if you are unsuccessful?

If a harpist loves your music they may contact you outside of the project. Harpists are not allowed to use or perform any music submitted without prior consent of the composer.
